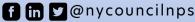

The New York Council of Nonprofits, Inc. (NYCON) supports all charitable organizations across New York state — of every size and type — and in 2022 proudly represented more than 3,000 members.

NYCON remained focused over the past year on its mission of developing and promoting an effective and vibrant charitable nonprofit community throughout New York State.

In 2022 NYCON experienced a major organizational change with the hiring of a new CEO. This did not disrupt NYCON's good work, as staff continued to offer a broad range of capacity building services that met the varying and evolving needs of nonprofits. In-house experts, including attorneys, governance specialists and organizational development consultants, again helped nonprofits meet their unique needs.

NYCON also worked with its affiliate organizations — Council Services Plus, BoardStrong, and Good Causes — to deliver a full continuum of support to nonprofit organizations.

NYCON will continue to work in partnership with members and funders in the year ahead to help members meet their missions and improve their communities.

POWERFUL OUTCOMES

In 2022, NYCON staff were able to achieve some impressive outcomes:

- We saw an increase in membership and retained 87% of our previous members.
- We've welcomed nearly 2,500 registrants to 59 NYCON events, including webinars, regional trainings, retreats and conferences.
- We undertook 355 individual client projects (with the majority funded by our powerful funding partner network) including:
 - o Bylaw and personnel policy reviews
 - Corporate filings
 - Board development and training engagements
 - o Mergers, affiliations and other corporate restructurings
 - o Strategic plans and program assessments
 - o Communications audits and rebranding projects
 - Succession plans
 - o Diversity, Equity and Inclusion assessments
 - Technology assessments and support
- We proactively reached out to members for their feedback and input: NYCON's new CEO completed a 10-stop tour around the state to hear directly from members about their needs and what NYCON can do to help.



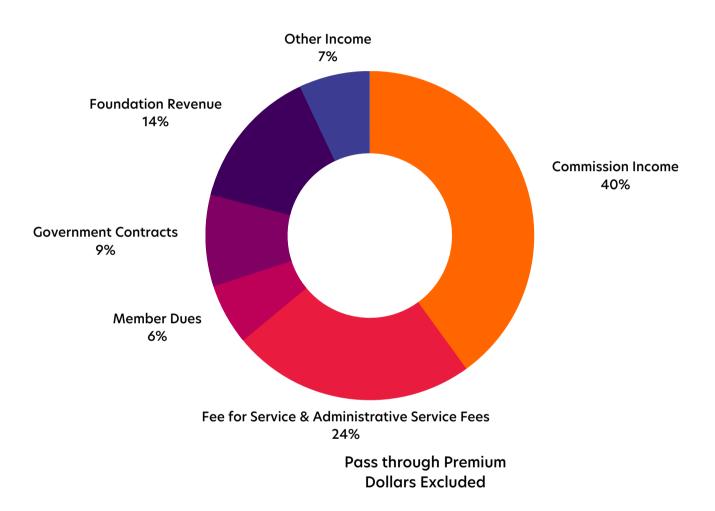
Our affiliates also had powerful results:

- BoardStrong's board-matching platform (boardstrong.org) saw 356 new nonprofits and 1,583 new board candidates using the system.
- CS Plus continued its growth in providing liability insurance and benefits to the nonprofit community, now serving more than 1,500 clients and with more than 3,500 policies.
- Good Causes provided fiscal sponsorship to 14 organizations and employment administration to 2 organizations, administering \$1,735,486 in funding for community based, charitable initiatives.





CONSOLIDATED REVENUE SOURCES

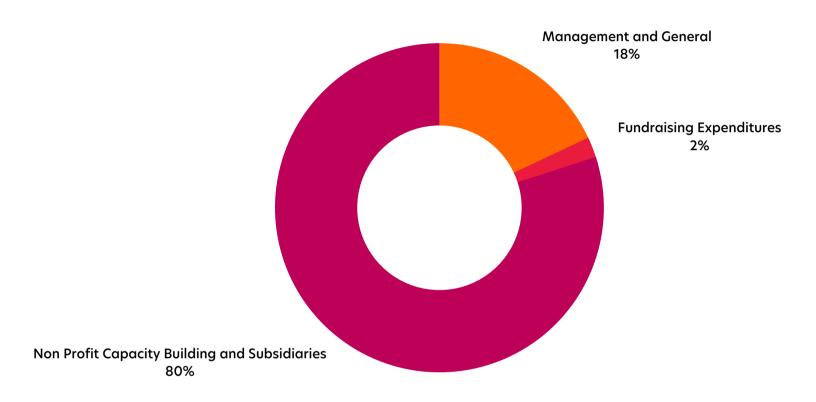


The Work We Do

BY THE NUMBERS

NYCON is one of the largest state nonprofit associations in the country (by overall membership size), but earned just 6% of its revenues in 2022 from membership dues. This is intentional, as NYCON has worked to have diverse revenue sources so that membership dues can be kept low, allowing all nonprofits to benefit from NYCON support.
